from the **Supervisor**

Dear Cascadians,

As we come to the end of another beautiful Michigan summer and return to regular routines, I would like to update you on two

current Township initiatives: (1) pending adoption of a **new Zoning Ordinance** and (2) implementing **improved internal financial processes** to reduce waste and increase accountability. These initiatives further our broader goals of **enhancing our residents' quality of life and preserving Cascade's unique character**.

Prioritizing Transparent & Accurate Accounting

At its June 25 Board of Trustees meeting, the Board received the auditors' opinion for Cascade Township's Fiscal Year 2024, along with the audited financial statements.

The audit process included roughly two hundred internal staff hours closing out the accounting records for FY 2024, followed by four external auditors working on-site the last week of March, examining Cascade's financial records, accounting practices, and internal controls to ensure that all public funds received and expended were accounted for.

Township Receives "Clean" FY 2024 Audit. The auditor issued a "clean" audit opinion, which means the auditor found *Cascade met the highest rating for its accuracy of financial record keeping*.

Improved Financial Practices Increase General Fund Balance. With respect to FY 2024 operating costs, Cascade maintained the previous year's reductions in administrative costs, *continuing the \$500,000 reduction of non-essential operating expenses from FY 2023*.

- In addition to reducing administrative costs, internal updates to revenue and reimbursement processes resulted in a \$1,455,687 increase in the general fund balance, with no reduction in services provided to residents. The result is an unassigned general fund balance of \$6,310,034—enough to cover eleven months of operating costs.
- The FY 2024 audit findings confirm that we are well-positioned to weather economic downturns, respond to unexpected disasters, and take advantage of unexpected opportunities.

The Board of Trustees wishes to thank Manager Jade Smith and Finance & Budget Director Lorna Nenciarini for their attention to detail, hard work, and ethical stewardship of taxpayer dollars. We appreciate their administrative leadership.

New Zoning Ordinance Proactively Manages Growth Pressures

Cascade's natural beauty and character combined with its proximity to a vibrant city with first-class amenities make it one of the most desirable places to live and do business in West Michigan. For these reasons, Cascade faces ongoing and intense growth and development pressures.

To protect residents' property values and quality of life, and despite intense pressures to develop the area east of the airport into industrial sites, current Township leadership is steadfast in its desire to keep this area, which includes this farm on Thornapple River Drive and 52nd Street, rural and residential.



Ensuring that future development enhances residents' quality of life and preserves Cascade's character requires *resisting development that diminishes the health or character of our community*. It also means proactively (and thoughtfully) encouraging development that aligns with our community's long-term growth goals.

Design for their new building, located at 6660 Old 28th St, incorporates proposed form based code design elements that are included in the Township's draft zoning ordinance, which is intended to encourage small-scale, quality redevelopment in the village area.

Recognizing that Cascade's old zoning ordinance failed to do this, Township leadership and staff have been comprehensively reviewing and updating the zoning ordinance over the past year. *A completed draft is scheduled for Board approval in the coming weeks. Priorities include preserving residential property values, conserving natural areas throughout the entire Township, addressing development concerns (such as subpar private roads), and creating a more walkable Village area between 28th Street, Cascade Road, and the Thornapple River.* Specific changes necessary to accomplish these goals include:

- Containing industrial and commercial development south and east of the airport to existing areas thereby maintaining the currently undeveloped natural buffer between industrial sites and residents' homes, farms, and the Thornapple River.
- Adopting form based code in the Village area requiring future redevelopment in that area to be limited in size and scale, quality, and pedestrian friendly (big box stores,

car dealerships and large-scale developments are not allowed in the Cascade Road/28th St/Thornapple River Drive area.)

- Clearly stated and elevated standards and requirements for new commercial and residential developments, specifically preserving current residents' property values and minimizing traffic congestion and straining public resources are included. Future private roads must be built to public road standards, at developer's expense.

The new zoning ordinance is scheduled for adoption by the Board of Trustees in the coming weeks.

It is an honor to serve as your Supervisor. Your thoughts, comments, and suggestions are welcome and important. I hope to hear from you soon.

CHANGES TO VOTING PRECINCTS

Cascade Township has made some important changes to the voting precincts. Visit the interactive map on our website at cascadetwp.com/elections.

WHAT'S NEW?

Cascade Township has condensed the number of precincts from 10 to 5. While some precinct numbers have changed, not all voters will be assigned to a different polling location. Please refer to the new precinct map (*right*) for more details.

UNDERSTANDING PRECINCTS VS. POLLING LOCATIONS

Precinct: A designated geographic area defined by the local Election Commission. Michigan law restricts the number of voters in each precinct to ensure manageable voting.

Polling Location: This is the specific place or facility where voters go to cast their votes. Sometimes voters from multiple precincts may use the same polling location.

WHAT HAS CHANGED?

Cascade Township previously had 10 precincts, which have now been consolidated into just 5 precincts. Affected voters will see a different precinct number on their voter ID card and ballot and may have a new polling location, but the voting process will remain the same.

WILL I BE NOTIFIED IF I'M AFFECTED?

Yes, the Cascade Township Clerk's Office will send out new voter ID cards to all voters. **ALL registered voters** will receive new voter ID cards with updated precinct and polling location information.

As always, our office is available to help residents find polling location information for any election.

WHY ARE THESE CHANGES HAPPENING?

With an increasing number of voters opting for absentee or early in-person voting, state law now allows for a higher number of voters per precinct, up to 4,999. The passing of Senate Bill 573 of 2023 (PA 227 of 2023) raised the precinct size limit from 2,999 to 4,999 voters per precinct, facilitating the consolidation of precincts.

Since the passing of Proposal 3 in 2018, allowing 'No Reason' absentee voting, and Proposal 2 in 2022, implementing 9 days of early voting, the Clerk's Office has observed a decrease in in-person voting on Election Day. As voters become more aware of early voting, we anticipate that in-person voting on Election Day will continue to decline and that each voting method—early voting, absentee ballots,

and Election Day voting—will average one-third of the total votes cast.

The Clerk's Office is confident that increasing the number of voters per precinct will not have an impact on election administration. While this change may increase the average number of voters in precincts on election day, we know our polling locations and workers can accommodate this. This change will also allow Clerk staff to respond more efficiently, as there will be staff members dedicated to assisting the 5 precincts instead of 10.

IMPACT OF ABSENTEE VOTING

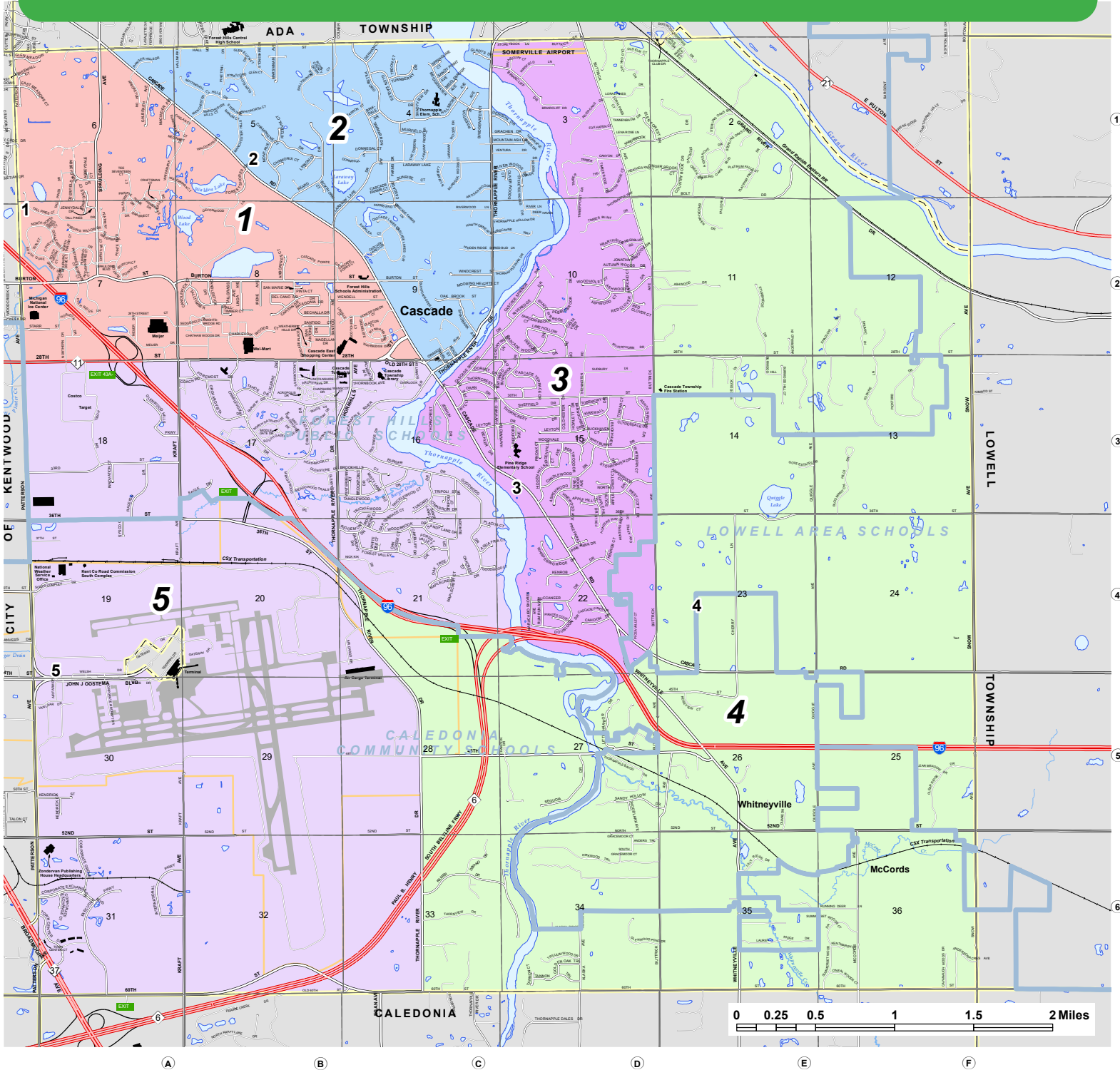
If you vote absentee, your precinct number may have changed on your ballot, but the voting process will remain the same. If you are on the permanent absentee ballot list or the permanent application list, you do not need to resubmit your forms.

Zoning Ordinance Proposed Amendment Overview

Township leadership is in the final stages of completing a comprehensive update to the Township's Zoning Ordinance, with formal adoption by the Board of Trustees scheduled for this month.

The updated Zoning Ordinance, which regulates current property development, is based on the goals and priorities set forth in Cascade's 2024 Master Plan. Top goals include improving the village area, ensuring quality new development, and preserving natural areas for future generations.

While large parts of the previous Zoning Ordinance remain the same, certain sections of the ordinance have been clarified and/or changed. Updates include:

VILLAGE REDEVELOPMENT

The Village area and nearby commercial districts will follow a Form Based Code, which sets standards for building design, landscaping, signage, and walkability, rather than focusing solely on land use. Adopting a Form Based Code for commercial areas in and around 28th St, Old 28th St, and from Cascade Road down to the Thornapple River ensures that private redevelopment, when it happens, is high quality and retains Cascade's timeless character.

28TH STREET COMMERCIAL BUILDINGS

New overlays for 28th Street and Centennial Park encourage a more cohesive and attractive commercial district. Standards are in place for future development along 28th St, shifting away from a previous emphasis on big box stores and car dealerships.

TREE PRESERVATION

In addition to their many ecological benefits, mature trees are an important characteristic of Cascade. The new Zoning Ordinance preserves this tree canopy by requiring new commercial, industrial, and certain residential developments to keep or replace in kind quality mature trees. This requirement is not applicable to existing residential and agricultural properties.

ACCESSORY BUILDINGS

The square footage permitted by right for an accessory building is now based, in part, on lot size. This means that residents with larger lots will no longer be required to obtain a Special Use permit via the Planning Commission, provided all zoning requirements are met. To preserve the character and enjoyment of the Thornapple River, new construction overwater boathouses are no longer permitted. Existing boathouses are unaffected.

ACCESSORY DWELLINGS

Secondary living structures, i.e. buildings with both a kitchen and bathroom, are generally prohibited. Secondary buildings may still be allowed to have either a kitchen or a bathroom. Structures with both a kitchen and bathroom are not permitted unless they meet all primary dwelling standards.

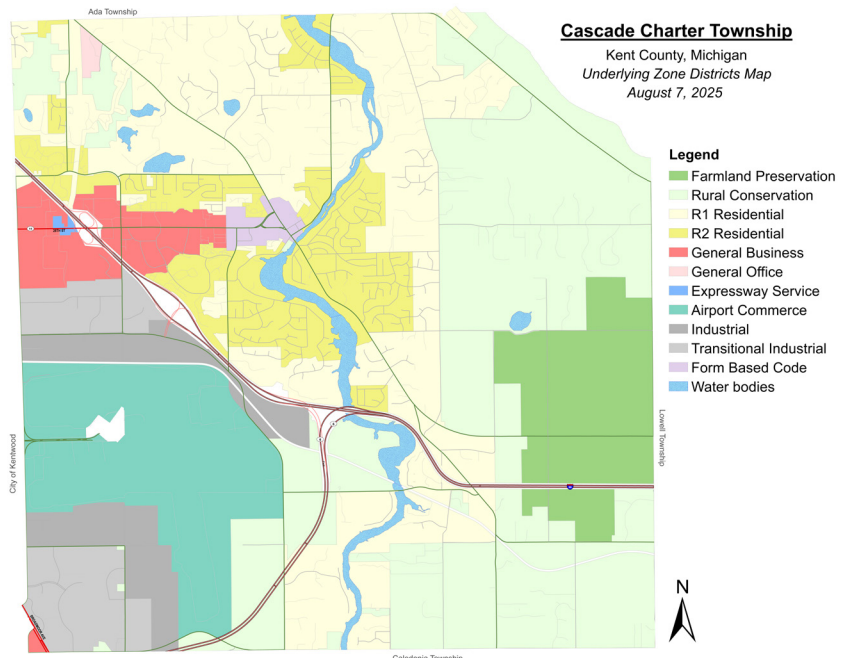
ANIMALS IN RESIDENTIAL AREAS

Bees, chickens, and goats are now allowed in residential areas, subject to zoning requirements and limitations.

OPTION TO VOLUNTARILY SELL DEVELOPMENT RIGHTS

To help preserve Cascade's rural character, the new Zoning Ordinance creates a mechanism for property owners to voluntarily preserve farmland and natural spaces for future generations. In addition to receiving property tax breaks, participants are compensated through various funding sources and government programs for entering into a formal agreement to not develop their property.

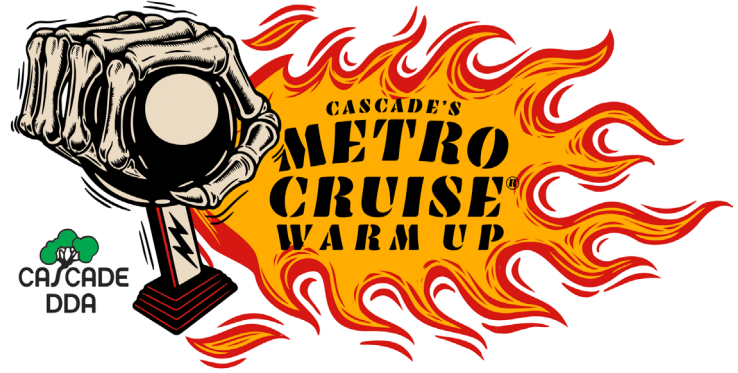

Volunteering In Parks

These invasive plants aggressively multiply and crowd out native species, creating dense thickets that migratory birds avoid.

The Township offers additional opportunities for families, scouts, and community groups to give back by volunteering in the parks. Gauge the Flow

Dam Data is Live

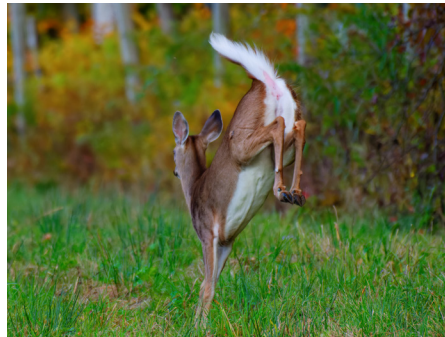
Residents now have access to real-time updates on water levels in the Thornapple River. Cascade Township recently installed a digital water elevation gauge in the Thornapple River above the Cascade Dam. The gauge tracks and records the river level every 10 minutes. The data is immediately uploaded to and available for viewing on the Township's website.

Whether you're curious about river conditions or keeping an eye on seasonal shifts, the gauge offers a new way to stay connected to local waterways.

Hunting Permits

Apply by Sep. 11

Archery hunting of antlerless deer is permitted during three scheduled hunting periods from late October through the end of December.

Those wishing to hunt must obtain a Township-issued permit. Permits are awarded through a lottery process. Applications may be submitted until September 11. Forty-five permits are available. Hunters must be 17 or older, hold a valid Michigan hunting license, and submit proof of identification. Portable stands or blinds are allowed but must be removed daily. Firearms, baiting, and littering are prohibited.

Do Not Knock

Strengthening Cascade's Solicitation Ordinance

In response to a growing number of resident complaints, Cascade Township amended the solicitation ordinance to be more robust, aimed at improving neighborhood safety and preserving resident privacy.

The updated ordinance, approved by the Township Board at its July 9 meeting, tightens regulations for individuals and organizations going door-to-door, with a focus on deterring aggressive and deceptive solicitation practices. Over the past year, Township staff have noted an increase in complaints about solicitors ignoring "No Soliciting" signs, approaching homes outside of the approved hours, and acting in ways that made residents feel uncomfortable or unsafe. These incidents, often linked to large out-of-state sales groups, underscored the need for stronger oversight.

KEY CHANGES INCLUDE:

- **Comprehensive Background Checks:** Applicants will now undergo a more extensive background screening to identify any history that may pose a safety risk.
- **Do Not Knock Registry:** Residents can opt out of door-to-door visits by adding their address to this new Township-managed list.
- **Clearer Rules and Penalties:** The ordinance outlines stricter behavior expectations and stronger enforcement measures for violations.

Some exemptions remain in place for political and religious canvassing, charitable organizations, and enrolled K-12 students.

Cascade Township remains committed to maintaining a welcoming yet secure environment. Residents can view the

Fall Cleaning

YARD WASTE DUMPSTERS

From October 13 through December 1, dumpsters will be available behind **Fire Station 2 at 2990 Buttrick Ave. SE**. The dumpsters are top-load, and yard waste must be carried up a small set of stairs to be dumped. Employees are not available to help dump yard waste.

BAGGED YARD WASTE PICKUP

Collection takes place **every Monday** from October 13 through December 1. Please place bags near the curb by Sunday at midnight.

This service is only available to residents in the restricted burn area, generally west of Buttrick Ave. and north of I-96. View the map: bit.ly/CT-burn-area.

IMPORTANT UPDATE: Yard waste tags **will be a different color** this year. Orange tags from last year will **NOT** be accepted. **If you still have orange tags, you must exchange them** at the Township Office for the new color of tags. **Only the new tags will be picked up.**

Bags of yard waste and bundles of branches **MUST** be tagged for collection. Bags and bundles must weigh less than 30 pounds each to be picked up. Please do **NOT** include grass clippings, dirt, sod, cement, sand, rocks, or pet waste.

Branches and stumps cannot exceed one inch in diameter and four feet in length.

Tags are available at the Township Office reception desk during office hours. Residents are limited to 20 tags. For more information, call the Township at 616-949-1500.

BURN PERMITS AVAILABLE ONLINE

All open burns require a permit, and you can quickly apply online at cascadetwp.com, or scan the QR code and view Cascade's burn ordinance.

Open burning is generally allowed year-round east of Buttrick Ave and south of I-96. In restricted areas, burning is allowed on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays from December 1 to August 31. View the map at bit.ly/CT-burn-area.

If a burn ban is in effect, online applications will be unavailable.

Permits can be requested up to three days in advance.

This event is for nonhazardous household waste only.

Proof of Cascade Township residency is required. (ID or bill)

No yard or hazardous waste will be accepted.

ITEMS ACCEPTED:

- Appliances (*refrigerators, dryers, microwaves, etc.*)
- Electronics (*TVs, computers, CD players, etc.*)
- Paint (*opened and dried*)
- Paper documents for shredding
- Scrap metal

ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED:

- Yard waste
- Batteries (*household, car, etc.*)
- Tires
- Hazardous waste (*pesticides, engine oil, etc.*)

Arrowaste Services will be on-site to collect general trash and junk, large appliances, and scrap metal.

Valley City Electronic Recycling will be on-site for computers, televisions, small appliances, cell phones, and other electronics.

Shred-It will be on-site to securely destroy and recycle paper documents.
